Anna's story proves that with passion, resilience, and a strong connection to your roots, even the simplest of beginnings can lead to great success. Through her hard work, she has not only improved her own life but also uplifted her community and inspired others to pursue their dreams through passion and entrepreneurship./PR

















## **3 Vietnamese nabbed for illegal** practice of medicine in Cavite



MANILA - Three Vietnamese nationals were ar rested in Cavite for allegedly practicing medi cine without the necessary licenses and permits the Criminal Investigation and Detection Group (CIDG) reported Sunday.

In a news release, the CIDG identified the arrested foreigners as Julie Nguyen, Luna Pham and Ryai Truong.

The three were arrested on Feb. 27 at a beaut lounge in Imus City for violation of Republic Ac 2382 or The Medical Act.

According to the belated report, the suspects intro duced themselves as doctors. They performed sten cell, hair regrowth, body sculpture and biostimu lation collagen injections and other derma-related procedures without the required medical licenses and permits to dispense medical products, operate a medical facility, or practice medicine in the Philippines.

Confiscated from the suspects were numerous boxes of assorted medicines and medical and cosmetic products; notebooks documenting medical procedures; prescription medications; and receipts issued to clients.

Complaints have already been filed against the suspects before the National Prosecution Service.


