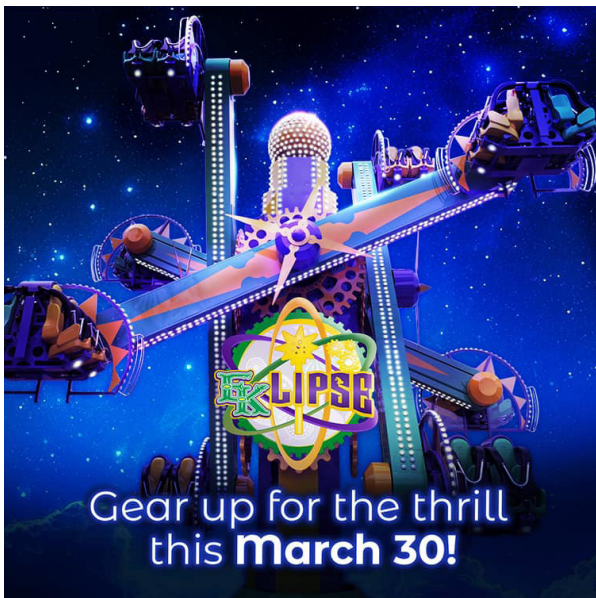


Enchanted Kingdom kicks off its 30th year with a new thrilling ride, EKlipse, the first of its kind in Southeast Asia

But the path to success was not easy. She faced financial difficulties, struggled with marketing and promotions, and more. Despite these setbacks, she remained optimistic, driven by her passion, faith, and dedication. As Anna shares with aspiring entrepreneurs: "Don't let your challenges define you; let them strengthen you. Your passion and perseverance are your greatest assets." 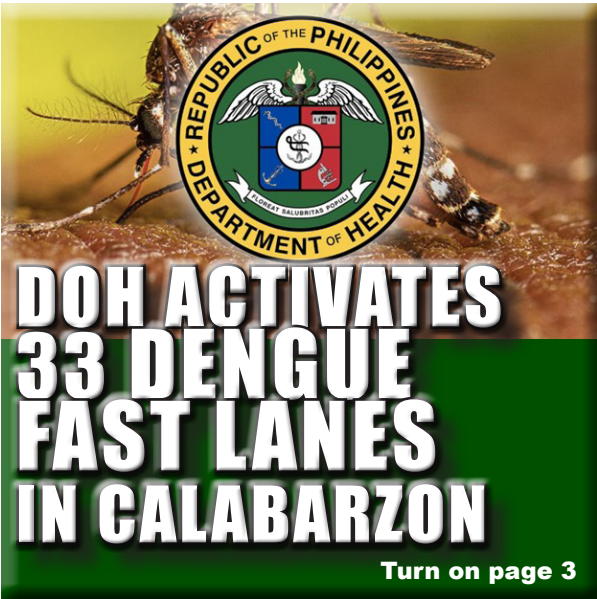
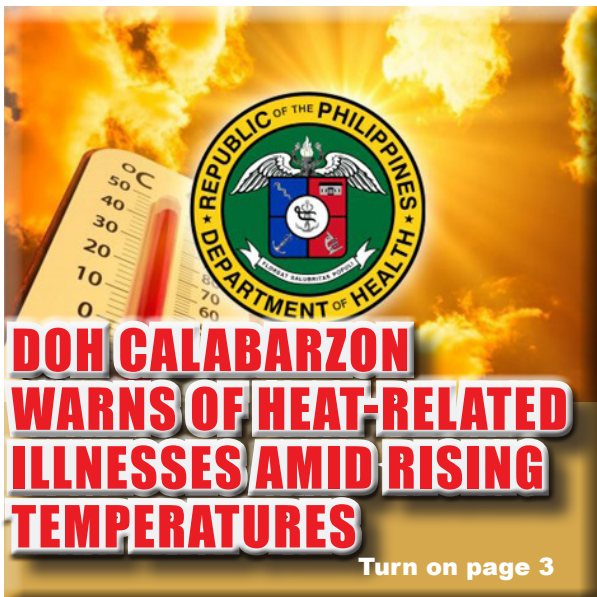

Confronting the Scorching Reality of the Philippine Heat Wave

The Philippines is no stranger to hot and humid weather, but the current heat wave gripping the country is pushing temperatures to dangerous extremes. With heat indices soaring past 40°C in several areas, millions of Filipinos are experiencing not just discomfort but serious health risks, economic disruptions, and environmental consequences. This heat wave is not just another seasonal occurrence—it is a glaring symptom of climate change. Rising global temperatures, intensified by deforestation and urbanization, have made extreme heat more frequent and severe. The Philippines, an archipelago already vulnerable to typhoons and rising sea levels, is now facing yet another climate-induced challenge: deadly heat.

Health at Risk
Prolonged exposure to extreme heat poses grave threats to public health. Heat exhaustion, dehydration, and heat stroke are becoming more common, particularly among the elderly, children, and outdoor workers. Hospitals are already reporting cases of heat-related illnesses, and if the temperatures continue to climb, the situation could turn into a full-blown public health crisis. The government and local authorities must act swiftly. Public advisories urging citizens to stay hydrated, limit outdoor activities, and seek shade are necessary but insufficient. There is an urgent need for heat emergency re-

sponse plans, such as setting up cooling centers in public spaces, ensuring sufficient water supply in communities, and providing protective measures for laborers exposed to extreme temperatures. Economic and Agricultural Strain
The sweltering heat is not only affecting human health but also taking a toll on the economy. Farmers are reporting crop failures due to dried-up irrigation systems, while extreme temperatures threaten livestock and fisheries. A prolonged heat wave could trigger food shortages and price hikes, worsening inflation and food security issues. Meanwhile, businesses and industries reliant on outdoor labor, such as construction and transportation, are struggling to cope. Productivity declines as workers face unsafe working conditions, and power consumption surges as people rely on air conditioning to escape the heat—placing additional strain on the already precarious energy grid.

Environmental Consequences
Aside from its direct human impact, extreme heat accelerates environmental degradation. Prolonged droughts lead to water shortages, reduced river flows, and forest fires. Heat waves also exacerbate air pollution, particularly in highly urbanized areas where smog traps heat, creating a cycle of worsening temperatures and health hazards. The Need for Long-Term Solutions
While short-term responses

are necessary, the Philippines must also confront the root causes of worsening heat waves. Climate change mitigation should not be a secondary concern—it must be a national priority. Stronger environmental policies, reforestation efforts, and sustainable urban planning must be implemented to counteract rising temperatures. Moreover, the government must invest in climate-resilient infrastructure, including heat-resistant housing, shaded public spaces, and efficient water management systems. Cities must be designed with heat reduction in mind, incorporating green spaces and ventilation systems that lessen urban heat islands. A Call for Collective Action
As temperatures continue to soar, Filipinos must recognize that this is not just a passing season of discomfort—it is a wake-up call. Every individual, community, and institution has a role to play in combating extreme heat, whether by adopting energy-efficient practices, planting trees, or supporting climate-friendly policies.

The heat wave is a reminder that climate change is not a distant threat; it is happening now, and its effects are being felt in real-time. The question is, how long will we endure its consequences before taking decisive action? The time to act is now—before the next heat wave becomes even deadlier.

In addition to the College of Medicine building, Senator Pia has also championed several other initiatives in CvSU, including the construction of dormitories, sports facilities for racket sports, the establishment of its Veterinary Biomedical Research Center, and the development of a smart campus—underscoring her commitment to holistic development in education, health, and sports./PR

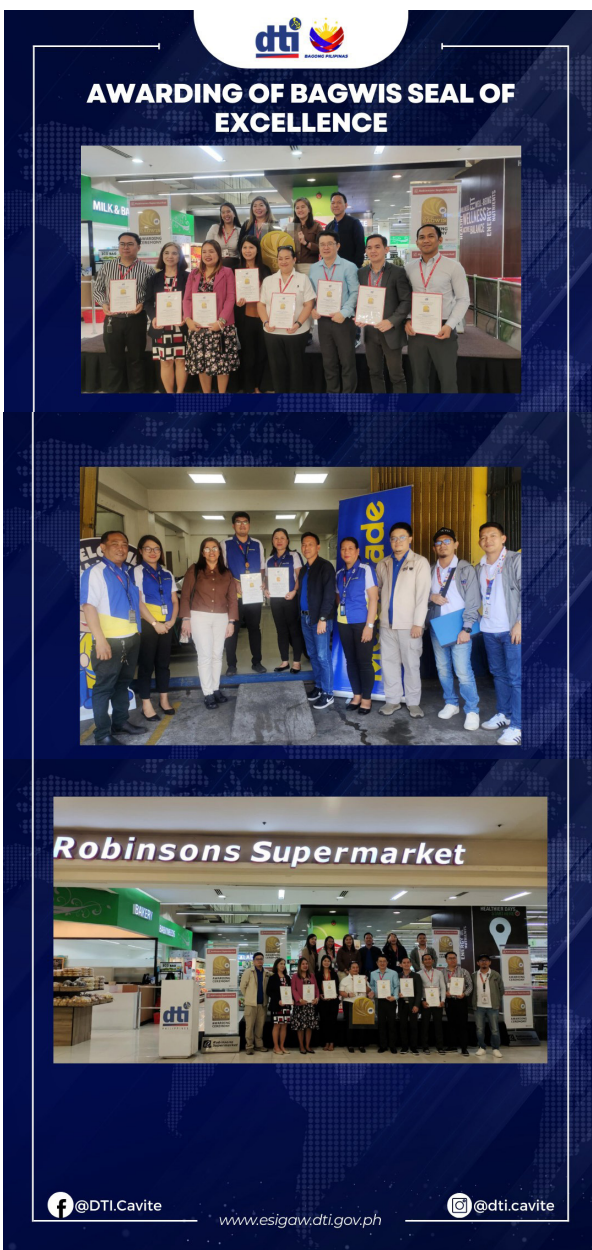

DOH ACTIVATES...

CALAMBA CITY, Laguna (PIA) — The Department of Health in Calabarzon has intensified its efforts to manage the rising cases of dengue by activating 33 "Dengue Fast Lanes" in Department of Health-operated and local government unit-run hospitals across the region.

In a radio interview, Assistant Regional Director Voltaire Guadalupe said they have instructed health facilities in the region to establish fast lanes to immediately respond to and manage suspected dengue patients.

"In Calabarzon, we have reactivated dengue fast lanes to promptly attend to patients showing symptoms of dengue. As of now, we have 33 dengue fast lanes across Calabarzon," Guadalupe said.

The Department of Health-Calabarzon also directed hospitals to set up hydration stations for dengue patients, citing the risk of dehydration due to dengue.

He added that the region has recorded 10,300 dengue cases from January to February 2025. Guadalupe said that the increase in cases may be attributed to climate change, making the population of Aedes aegypti mosquitoes unpredictable compared to previous years.

"Dengue is no longer seasonal. There is no longer a single month without dengue cases, unlike in past years. Climate change has altered temperature and humidity patterns, making mosquito populations unpredictable," he said.

He also emphasized that local health offices have been actively reporting cases to ensure proper monitoring and decision-making for dengue prevention and elimination.

When asked about the declaration of outbreaks, Guadalupe stated that while the Department of Health provides guidance, the final decision to declare a dengue outbreak rests with local officials,

ANTIPOLO CITY, Rizal — The DA-Agricultural Training Institute (ATI) CALABARZON conducted the second phase of "Training of Trainers on Participatory Guarantee System (PGS)" on February 17-21 at MARIWSKA Integrated Farm, Brgy. San Jose, in this city.

It aimed to capacitate the 33 members of the Marikina Watershed Kaysakat Association (MARIWSKA), a non-government organization based in Antipolo City, on the establishment and operations of the PGS consistent with the Philippine National Standards for Organic Agriculture and other regulations.

The said activity is a follow-up to the training conducted last year wherein the group was trained in Module 1 and Module 2 of the PGS. It also focused on the preparation of internal standards and manual of operations as well as a mock peer review with Bobcel Integrated Farm and MARIWSKA Integrated Farm which will form part of the core PGS Group.

"Maraming salamat po sa ATI at DA-RFO IV-A sa muling pagkakaroon ng training para sa MARIWSKA para sa katuparan ng pangarap ng aming grupo. Sa sama-samang nating pagtutulungan, 'di malayo na maabot natin ang minimithing pangarap

na PGS certification at accreditation ng ating grupo," said Patricia Hanna Bayobo.

Experts from DA-Regional Field Office IV-A namely Mr. Arnaldo P. Gonzales from the Organic Agriculture Program and Mr. Mariani to E. Mendoza, Jr. from the Regulatory Division, together with Ms. Soledad E. Leal of DA-ATI CALABARZON, served as resource persons throughout the program.

The group will be applying for certification under the PGS by the second semester of the year and they are hopeful that they will be included in the roster of PGS-certified groups in the country./PR

DOH...

CALAMBA CITY, Laguna (PIA)— The Department of Health (DOH) in Calabarzon has warned the public against heat-related illnesses as the region continues to experience rising temperatures.

In a Regional Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Council (RDRRMC) meeting held on March 6, DOH officials advised the public to take necessary precautions, such as staying hydrated and avoiding prolonged exposure to heat.

"We have to be frequently hydrated, drink as much water as possible throughout the day, and avoid exposure to direct sunlight to prevent heat-related illnesses such as heat cramps, heat syncope, heat exhaustion, and heat stroke," the agency said.

DOH Calabarzon has emphasized that prolonged exposure to

heat may increase the risk of heat stroke, a serious health condition that might result in severe complications.

The high heat index in some parts of the region has prompted some local government units to suspend face-to-face classes, while others have shifted to online modular learning.

The Department of Education (DepEd) has also approved the implementation of schedule adjustments to ensure the safety of students and school personnel amid the high temperature.

Meanwhile, the Regional Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Council (RDRRMC) Calabarzon has urged local DRRM offices to intensify public information campaigns and advisories on heat-related illness prevention.

According to state weather bureau Pagasa, temperatures in the

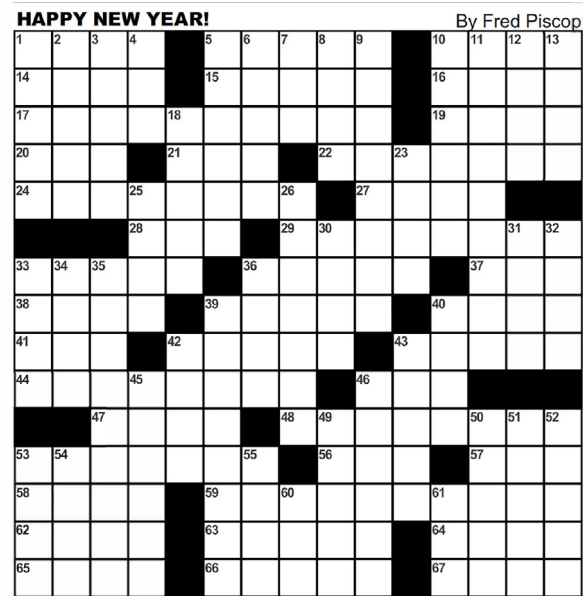
region are expected to remain high for the rest of the week, with extreme caution about heat index levels.

PAGASA said prolonged activity and exposure could lead to heat cramps and exhaustion, which may lead to heat stroke.

The state weather bureau continues to advise the public to monitor weather updates and follow safety guidelines to prevent heat-related health risks. (FC, PIA4A)

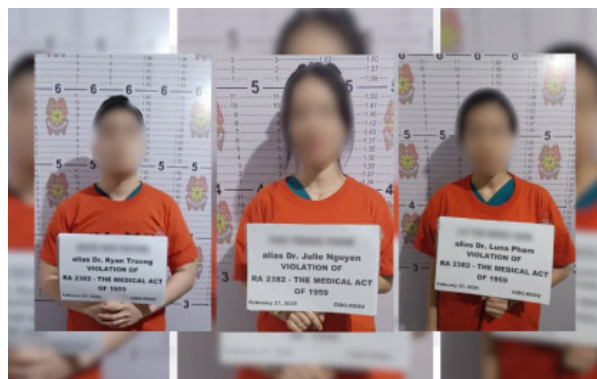

3 Vietnamese nabbed for illegal practice of medicine in Cavite



MANILA – Three Vietnamese nationals were arrested in Cavite for allegedly practicing medicine without the necessary licenses and permits the Criminal Investigation and Detection Group (CIDG) reported Sunday.

In a news release, the CIDG identified the arrested foreigners as Julie Nguyen, Luna Pham and Ryan Truong.

The three were arrested on Feb. 27 at a beautiful lounge in Imus City for violation of Republic Act 2382 or The Medical Act.

According to the belated report, the suspects introduced themselves as doctors. They performed stent cell, hair regrowth, body sculpture and biostimulation collagen injections and other derma-related procedures without the required medical licenses and permits to dispense medical products, operate a medical facility, or practice medicine in the Philippines.

Confiscated from the suspects were numerous boxes of assorted medicines and medical and cosmetic products; notebooks documenting medical procedures; prescription medications; and receipts issued to clients.

Complaints have already been filed against the suspects before the National Prosecution Service.

"We encourage the public to report any illegal practice of medicine and other criminal activities in your localities and your CIDG will do the rest," CIDG chief Maj. Gen. Nicolas Torre III said in a statement. (PNA)
