BRIDGING NATURE AND TECH-NOLOGY: QR CODES HIGHLIGHT PRIORITY FLORA SPECIES AT MTS. BANAHAW-SAN CRISTOBAL PROTECTED LANDSCAPE





The DENR-CENRO Sta. Cruz, in collaboration with the Protected Area Management Office of Mts. Banahaw-San Cristobal Protected Landscape (MBSCPL) Laguna, completed the installation of Quick Response (QR) codes on 36 tagged priority flora species within Taytay Falls in Majayjay, Laguna.

This initiative aims to enhance visitor awareness of diverse flora species that can be encountered along the trail going to Taytay Falls. QR codes have been strategically attached to tree-tagged priority flora species throughout the protected area, offering visitors an engaging and educational experience. With a simple scan, these QR codes provide detailed information about the species, including the Family Name, Scientific Name, Vernacular Name, Description, Distribution, Uses and Benefits, as well as information about the flowers, seeds, and seedlings of each identified priority flora species.

This innovative approach not only enhances visitor engagement but also underscores the importance of preserving the unique flora of MBSCPL. This pioneering effort helps improve the tree tagging system for flora species in the vicinity of Taytay Falls and exemplifies the fusion of environmental stewardship and digital innovation, inviting the public to become more informed and involved in protecting one of the Philippines' most treasured landscapes./PR





The AQMS is now operational and is located within the SMPHI property in Matandang Balara, Quezon City. The station can measure particulate matter 10 and 2.5 (PM10 and PM2.5) and is seamlessly integrated with the EMB-NCR's Data Acquisition and Handling System (DAHS). This connectivity allows for real-time transmission of air quality data to the bureau's central database, enabling policymakers and environmental agencies to respond effectively to air quality concerns in the National Capital Region. /PR




