


## **CALAX RECOGNIZED FOR OUTSTAND-ING CONTRIBUTIONS AT SOUTH** LUZON





## **CAVITE GOVERNOR LEADS DIS-TRIBUTION OF RELLIEF GOODS TO STORM AFFECTED FAMILIES**

Governor Athena Tolentino, on Friday morning, visited the affected families of severe tropical storm Kristine in Barangay Sapang, Ternate to personally assist in the distribution of emergency food packs and assess their situation at the evacuation centers and temporary shelters in the aftermath of the calamity.

As of initial situation report from the Emergency Operations Center, a total of 3,933 families or 13,981 individuals were affected by Kristine from different cities and municipalities in Cavite, mostly in coastal and floodprone areas. The provincial government is continuously monitoring and coordinating with LGUs for updates on the situation on the ground while sorting and starting the distribution of relief packages.

## **CAVITE POLICE APPREHENDS HIGH-VALUE INDIVIDUAL IN BUY BUST OPERATION IN TANZA: 20 GRAMS OF SUSPECTED SHABU AND** .45 CALIBER PISTOL SEIZED

Camp BGen Pantaleon Garcia, Imus City, Cavite - In a continued effort to combat illegal drug activities, the Cavite Police apprehended a high-value individual (HVI) and seized approximately 20 grams of suspected shabu valued at around PHP 136,000.00, along with a caliber .45 pistol and one extended magazine loaded with five live ammunition, during a buy-bust operation on October 28, 2024, at approximately 11:20 PM in Brgy. Amaya 1, Tanza, Cavite. PLTCOL Chester Noel Borlongan, Chief of the Provincial Intelligence Unit (PIU), identified the arrested suspect as alias "Pards," a 47-yearold male residing in Brgy. Amaya 1, Tanza. The operation was carried out by joint operatives from the Provincial Drug Enforcement Unit (PDEU) of the Cavite Police Provincial Office (PPO), the Philippine Drug Enforcement Agency (PDEA) Cavite, and personnel from the Tanza Municipal Police Station (MPS). During the operation, authorities confiscated five heatsealed transparent plastic sachets containing suspected shabu, in addition to the marked buy-bust money. Criminal charges are currently being prepared against the suspect, and the seized evidence has been submitted to the Cavite Provincial Forensic Unit (PFU) for chemical examination. PBGEN Paul Kenneth T. Lucas, Regional Director of PRO CALABARZON, commended the Cavite Police and the participating units, led by PCOL Dwight E. Alegre, for their unwavering commitment to eradicating illegal drugs in the province. "This significant accomplishment reflects the collective efforts of the Cavite PNP and the community. The Cavite police have intensified their campaign against illegal drugs to ensure a peaceful and orderly province while working to eliminate the drug menace," stated PD Alegre. /CPPO
