Trece Martires City, Cavite – In a significant stride toward enhancing public health and nutrition services, the Provincial Government of Cavite launched the 1st Cavite Nutritionist-Dietitians' Conference on July 4, 2025, at the Cavite Collaboration Center for Public Health. Organized through the Office of the Provincial Health Officer – Nutrition Program Team, the event was held in celebration of National Nutrition Month 2025, bearing the theme “Strengthening Capacities Towards Enhanced Nutrition Service Delivery.”

The pioneering conference brought together nutritionists and dietitians from various local government units (LGUs), academic institutions, and partner agencies across the province. The event served as a platform for collaboration, professional development, and the sharing of best practices aimed at improving nutrition outcomes in Cavite communities.

Dr. Nonie John Dalisay, Cavite Provincial Health Officer, officially opened the conference with a message of encouragement and recognition for the role of nutrition professionals in the province's healthcare framework.

“This conference is not just a celebration of your profession,

Ms. Dorothy Caroline Dela Cruz (Pagamutan ng Dasmariñas), who presented on clinical nutrition's role in patient care;

And Ms. Theresa A. Rivas (National Nutrition Council–CALABARZON), who concluded with a compelling talk on translating national nutrition goals into local action.

Capping off the event, Ms. Dessa May Alibangbang, District Nutrition Program Coordinator, extended heartfelt thanks to all attendees and contributors who made the first-ever conference a resounding success.

“Your participation and support have made this landmark event possible. Together, we are building a stronger, healthier Cavite,” she said in her closing remarks.

The conference is poised to become an annual gathering of Cavite's nutrition leaders, as the province continues to invest in capacity-building and collaborative efforts to fight malnutrition and promote holistic health care.

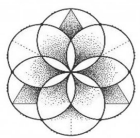

Senator Alan Peter
Cayetano on Thursday
renewed his call to fix
what he described as a
fragmented education
system by reintroducing
a bill that would create
the Third Congressional
Commission on Educa-
tion or EDCOM III.
The EDCOM III Act,
one of Cayetano’s pri-
ority bills in the 20th Con-
gress, seeks to bring to-
gether the Department
of Education (DepEd),
Commission on Higher
Education (CHED), and
the Technical Education
and Skills Development
Authority (TESDA) un-
der a single coordinat-
ing commission.
Designed as a parlia-
mentary-style body,
EDCOM III will not
dilute the independence
of the three agencies.
Instead, it will allow
their heads to work
closely with lawmak-
ers, local governments,
and education stake-
holders to ensure better
alignment, from policy
design down to imple-
mentation.
The Commission will
be co-chaired by four
lawmakers, namely the
chairs of the Senate and
House committees on
Basic Education, Arts,
and Culture, and on
Higher, Technical, and
Vocational Education.
It will also include
an Advisory Support
Council (ASC) com-
posed of representa-

tives from the academe,
business sector, parents’
associations, LGUs, and
civil society groups.
Among EDCOM III’s
key priorities are tack-
ling the learning crisis,
reducing dropout rates,
improving digital infra-
structure, and address-
ing persistent issues
such as stunting and
workforce mismatch.
The bill also proposes
using tools like artificial
intelligence to modern-
ize education and make
it more responsive to
industry needs.
Complementary to
Cabinet Cluster for Ed-
ucation
EDCOM III is designed
to work alongside an-
other major reform:
the Education Cabinet
Cluster, also proposed
by Cayetano and al-
ready approved in prin-
ciple by the President.
The Cabinet Cluster
brings together execu-
tive agencies involved
in education and labor
to improve inter-agency
coordination and en-
sure smoother imple-
mentation of programs.
EDCOM III, by con-
trast, focuses on long-
term planning, poli-
cy development, and
stronger oversight from
Congress. It is also
meant to be permanent,
unlike bodies created
through Presidential
orders.
Cayetano first filed the
bill in the 19th Con-

gress as co-chair of
EDCOM II, which had
flagged the disjointed
implementation of pro-
grams across DepEd,
CHED, and TESDA as
a factor in the country’s
education woes.
He emphasized the need
for a common vision
for education and close
coordination between
Congress and executive
agencies to make it a re-
ality.
“The urgency of this
reform cannot be over-
stated,” he said.
“If we are to produce
a globally competitive
workforce and make
education the true driv-
er of national develop-
ment, we need decisive,
coordinated action,” he
continued.
Senate President Fran-
cis “Chiz” Escudero,
Senator Pia Cayetano,
and Senator Joel Vil-
lanueva, who serves as
a commissioner of ED-
COM II, co-authored the
bill.
In his explanatory note,
Cayetano also anchored
the bill on a biblical
principle from Gala-
tians 6:7: “Kung ano
ang itinanim, siyang
aanihin.”
“By laying the ground-
work for a truly co-
hesive and responsive
education system, we
aim to transform the
nation by building the
right foundations,” he
said.###

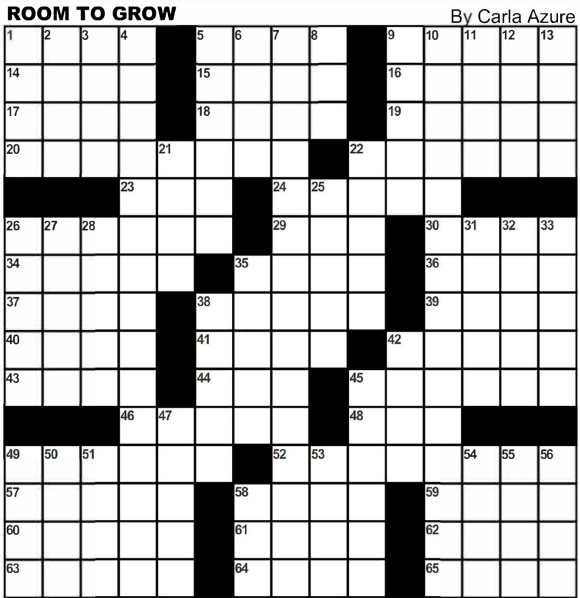
