#WECANBEEQUALL: PCW CALLS TO DOUBLE DOWN ON GENDER EQUALITY, PARTNERS WITH MULTI-STAKEHOLDERS TO KICK OFF NATIONAL WOMEN'S MONTH CELEBRATION



Women and Everyone (WE) can be EquALL!

This is the call of the Philippine Commission on Women (PCW), national entity for gender equality and women empowerment, as it marked the beginning of the month-long celebration of Women's Month on March 1, 2024 at the SM North EDSA Skydome, which was supported by its partners from the United Nations, SM Supermalls, and the Department of Labor and Employment (DOLE).

The PCW, headed by its Officer-in-Charge Atty. Khay Ann Magundayao-Borlado, kicked off the National Women's Month Celebration with a series of activities such as the conduct of the second nationwide Safe Spaces Act (SSA) Orientation, the illumination of the SM North EDSA LED tunnel as part of its Purple Your Icon campaign, and the launch of the Walk in Her Shoes Exhibit.

In her opening message during the SSA Orientation, Atty. Borlado shared that this year's sub-theme of the Women's Month "Lipunang Patas sa Bagong Pilipinas: Kakayahan ng Kababaihan, Patutunayan!" calls for a Bagong Pilipinas, a thrust of President Ferdinand R. Marcos, Jr., where women are given equitable opportunities and not hindered by gender biases and discriminatory stereotypes.

"Kakayahan ng Kababaihan, Patutunayan: It aims to showcase and harness the full potential of women and girls in actively engaging in and benefitting from national growth and development. In order for women and girls to maximize their full potential, we, as duty bearers, have the obligation to ensure that public spaces like SM Supermalls are a safe space," Atty. Borlado explained.

She commended SM for being an active partner of PCW in making public spaces such as their malls safe spaces for all regardless of gender and hopes that more private companies and individuals will follow their

"Indeed, you are a trailblazer in the private sector, and we hope that other players and personalities will follow in raising the awareness and consciousness of their employees, tenants, and other stakeholders on how we can really make public spaces truly a safe space for every Juana and Juan," Atty. Borlado added.

Ms. Jessica Bianca T. Sv. Assistant Vice President and Program Director of SM Prime Holdings, Inc. supports PCW's call for gender equality and encourages her colleagues at SM to continue their commitment to create a welcoming environment in their malls and a more equitable world for all.

"Our continued collaboration with esteemed partners such as the Department of Labor and Employment and the Philippine Commission on Women including the United Nations underscores our dedication to creating a world where every woman feels not only safe but truly empowered," she stated.

Ms. Sy also recognized that there are women systemic challenges that Filipino women continue to face today both in the workplace and in society. Bawal Bastos sa Bagong Pilipinas: The Safe Spaces Act Orientation

The Safe Spaces Act (Republic Act No. 11313) supplements RA 7877 (or the Anti-Sexual Harassment Act of 1995) and provides mechanisms for the protection of both sexes against any form of gender-based sexual harassment (GBSH) in all kinds of spaces such as streets and public spaces, educational and training institutions, cyberspace, and workplaces. It was signed on April 17, 2019, was published on July 19, 2019, and finally took effect on August 3, 2019.

PCW, SM, and DOLE jointly conducted a nationwide orientation on SSA in October 2023 to a total of 7,614 participants who were taught to help eliminate GBSH against women in their homes, workplaces, and

Usec. Benavidez, also the resource speaker for the two nationwide SSA Orientations, discussed all about SSA also known as Bawal Bastos Law, what constitutes GBSH and where it may be committed, what are considered public spaces, the penalties for committing GBSH, the zero-tolerance policy, as well as where

can victims of GBSH in street and public spaces seek assistance. He even made his discussion interactive by asking the audience to participate in the online pre- and post-tests and by answering their questions during the open forum, which was joined in by more male participants.

The participation of more than 10,000 attendees, according to Engr. Liza B. Silerio, Vice President of the Corporate Compliance Group, has empowered and enabled them to appreciate the Safe Spaces Act; thus, she is hopeful that they can share all the learnings with their colleagues, co-workers, friends, and relatives because "Bawal bastos sa SM!" and "Bawal bastos sa Bagong Pilipinas!'

Purple is Power: Purple Your Icon Campaign and #PurpleFridays Movement

As part of the 2024 Women's Month celebration, the PCW also launched Purple Your Icon, an advocacy initiative that encourages everyone to light up or decorate their offices, landmarks, and places in purple.

"Why purple? The color purple has a special connection to the fight for women's rights. Though not used by all groups, it holds special meaning for many. In the past, purple was associated with royalty and power, things women were often denied. Feminist groups, like the British women's suffrage rights activists and the American National Woman's Party, chose purple to show their own strength and demand equal rights. While different groups within the broader movement might have used varying color schemes, the symbolic use of purple by prominent organizations cemented its connection to the feminist advocacy for equality and empowerment, a legacy that continues to resonate today," Atty. Borlado explained during the illumination of the SM North EDSA LED tunnel also held on March 1.

The PCW expressed its gratitude to SM for illuminating the facade of its six malls in purple, showcasing the celebration's theme at its nine malls, and featuring the advocacy in its directories across all 85 locations. Aside from SM, many government agencies and private entities joined the campaign through illuminated buildings, landmarks, and even personal spaces including the Malacanang Palace, National Museum, Rizal Park, Cultural Center of the Philippines, and the Philippine International Convention Center, among oth-

Today, as we kick off the month-long celebration of women, we stand together in this Purple Your Icon advocacy to illuminate not just buildings and landmarks, but also the path towards a gender-equal Philippines. Adorning our surroundings this month serves not only as a beautiful tribute, but also as a powerful symbol. Purple signifies the spirit of women's rights, highlighting the fight for equality and empowerment. it represents a future where limitations and stereotypes are transcended," Atty. Borlado added.

Through this Purple Your Icon advocacy, the PCW hopes to spark conversations about women, champion their rights to carve their own path and be free from the constraints of societal expectations, and remind everyone that true progress lies in dismantling the root causes of gender inequality.

In addition, the PCW invites every Juana and Juan to join #PurpleFridays movement by wearing something purple every Friday of the month of March to stand alongside women and advocate for their rights.

Aside from its purple campaigns, the Women's Commission will lead the International Women's Day cel-

ebration on March 8 with the theme, "Investing in Equality toward Gender-Inclusive Prosperity", which is anchored in the IWD theme, "Invest in women: Accelerate progress". The focus for this event will be on addressing poverty and strengthening institutions and financing through a gender perspective. Her Story Matters: The Walk in Her Shoes Exhibit

Capping off the National Women's Month Celebration kickoff in the Philippines, the PCW partnered with UN Women, UN Gender Thematic Group (GTG), and SM Cares in launching the Walk in Her Shoes Exhibit at the SM North EDSA.

Being the national entity for gender equality and women empowerment and the lead agency of the National Women's Month Celebration and the 18-day Campaign to End Violence Against Women (VAW), the PCW advocates the importance of letting the voices of Filipino women be heard especially about the things hat matter to them including personal experiences that may have involved a form of violence due to their identity as women," Atty. Borlado stated.

The Commission on Women believes that in order for VAW to be eliminated, it should be first seen and understood from the perspective of women themselves; hence, women's voices and priorities should take center stage at last.

Women of today cannot wait any longer. Violence against them must end now. Otherwise, the cycle of hurt will continue to affect even the women of tomorrow thus, creating more stories of untold sorrow." Atty,

The PCW added that initiatives like the Walk in Her Shoes Exhibit can help raise awareness that VAW is not ust a special concern nor a sole problem of women, rather, it is a universal concern.

Moreover, Atty. Borlado shared five roots and truths about VAW and emphasized the importance of ending this phenomenon as it is a barrier to gender equality: (1) VAW is an offshoot of gender bias, (2) VAW is violence against humans, (3) VAW is a social development issue, (4) VAW is a global health crisis, and (5) VAW is a culture that can start at home.

Because VAW hurts not only women and girls, but also men and boys, and the society as a whole. Thus, every Juana and Juan must work hand in hand to help end VAW, to dig up the roots of pain and sorrow, to plant new seeds of healing and freedom, and to create a safe space that will encourage and empower women o speak up and stand up, not just for themselves but for the next generation of Juanas and Juans," Atty.

She ended her speech with a powerful and inspiring message: "Like any other stories, her story matters too. And you will never know what a woman is going through until you walk in her shoes."

Atty, Pearl Javagan Turley, Assistant Vice President of the Corporate Compliance Group and Program Diector for the Women's Committee of SM Cares, echoed what Atty Borlado said.

"Indeed, stories matter more so if they are about women. And the Filipino Women's trials and struggles that are woven into the fabric of this Walk in Her Shoes Exhibit remind us of the diverse challenges that women face and the importance of standing in solidarity with them," she said.

Walk in Her Shoes is an audio visual exhibit organized by the UN GTG featuring five stories of VAW victim-survivors including an Overseas Filipino Worker, a single mother, and a woman in armed conflict. In conclusion, partners from the United Nations expressed their support for the PCW's advocacy to end VAW and all forms of gender-based violence because they, too, believe that Women and Everyone can be equal and should work hand in hand to achieve a gender-equal society.

MANILA, Philippines — Two teacher groups have urged the Department of Education to stop the implementation of Catch Up Fridays as more students have reportedly been skipping school on Fridays due to a lack of engagement with the program, especialv in schools with limited reading materials.

In separate statements and interviews, the Alliance of Concerned Teachers (ACT) and the Teachers' Dignity Coalition (TDC) criticized DepEd's lack of provision of reading materials for teachers to carry out the weekly reading intervention program, leading to its uneven implementation in schools.

"After a month of imple-

menting Catch-Up Fridays, it is the teachers who bear the brunt of the additional workload in preparation and implementation. Due to the lack or insufficiency of books or materials, teachers are forced to spend on photocopying reading materials," ACT Chairper son Vladimer Quetua said. "Absence of guidelines leaves room for interpretation, resulting in a variety of activities deemed as 'Ready Activities'. Reports also indicate an increase in student absenteeism and tardiness on Fridays, posing challenges for teachers n achieving the objectives

"They think, 'Might as well just be absent. That's the reports received by members of TDC," Basas said in

Launched by DepEd in January, Catch Up Fridays is a weekly learning intervention program that requires schools to dedicate half of the day to reading activities and the other half to values, health and peace education. The reading interven-

tion program targets both non-readers and students who can read through "differentiated instruction," a teaching strategy that aims to benefit a wide range of students by tailoring lessons to students' specific interests and needs. However, based on EDCOM 2's initial assessment of the program, teachers struggle mplement differentiated instruction in class due to lack of training.

DepEd last week flagged reports that some school personnel have resorted to selling books and workbooks and requiring parents and students to buy these. The department urged parents not to "patronize such transactions' as the weekly program should not require out-ofpocket expenses.

Basas said this only indicates that the responsibility of providing students with reading materials had been passed onto teachers and school personnel.

MANILA, Philippines — Energy utility provider Manila Electric Co. (Meralco) has increased electricity rates this March by P0.0229 per kilowatt-hour, marking the third increase this year.

The adjustment brings the overall rate to P11.9397 per kwh from last month's P11.9168 per kwh, with residential customers consuming 200 kwh expected to see an increase of P5 in their electricity bill.

"Usually, if the reduction of generation charge is significant, the overall rates will decrease, but unfortunately... the increase of transmission charge is high," Meralco vice president and head of corporate communications Joe Zaldarriaga said.



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Water levels in Luzon dams below normal

MANILA, Philippines — The water levels of eight dams in Luzon continued to drop amid the impact of the El Niño phenomenon, the latest monitoring of the hydro meteorological division of the Philippine Atmospheric, Geophysical and Astronomical Services Administration (PAGASA)

As of 6 a.m. yesterday, the water level of Angat Dam had dropped by 0.23 meters after it reached 203.25 meters from the previous level of 203.48 meters. This is 8.75 meters below the normal high water level of 212 meters.

But even with the decrease, Angat Dam is still 23.25 meters above its minimum water level of 180 meters. The dam supplies more than 90 percent of Metro Manila's potable water needs and provides for the irrigation needs of 25,000 hectares of farmlands in Bulacan and Pampanga provinces

The hydro meteorological division monitoring report also shows a decline in the water elevations of seven other Lu-

The La Mesa Dam in Quezon City reached 76.95 meters or 0.15 meters less compared to its previous level of 77.10 meters. In Benguet province, the Ambuklao Dam is at 747.74 meters, or 0.07 meters less compared to its previous level of 747.81 meters, while its Binga Dam in Benguet is at 570.67 meters or 0.24 meters less compared to its previous level of 570.91 meters.

The San Roque Dam in Pangasinan province is at 239.02 meters, or 0.29 meters less compared to its previous level of 239.31 meters.

Pantabangan Dam in Nueva Ecija also dropped to 182.66 meters or 0.34 meters less compared to its previous level of 183 meters. Isabela province's Magat Dam is at 172.12 meters, or 0.25 meters less compared to its previous level of 172.37 meters. The Calirava Dam in Laguna is at 286.20 meters, or 0.04 meters less compared to its previous level of 286.24 meters.

PAGASA said the El Niño has started to weaken and may return to neutral conditions starting next month and lasting until June, when the La Niña phenomenon develops. Its model forecasts suggest an increasing probability of the La Niña to develop in June until August.

"La Niña is characterized by unusually cooler than average sea surface temperatures in the central and eastern equatorial Pacific," PAGASA said. It added that a pre-developing La Niña, historically, is characterized by below-normal rainfall

"Therefore, the possibility of a slight delay in the onset of the rainy season is likely with the combined effects of the ongoing El Niño," PAGASA said.

Heat index to intensify

The heat index is expected to intensify in April with the end of the southeast monsoon or amihan and will be further aggravated by the peak of El Niño, according to PA-

"At present, we are still experiencing the peak of El Niño where there is a significant reduction in the rainfall in different areas and these (areas) will further increase in April," PAGASA Climatology and Agrometeorology Division officer-in-charge Anna Lisa Solis said in a radio

Areas affected by the drought will also increase to 40 provinces next month compared to the current 24 provinces, she added.

Aside from the 40 provinces, at least 25 areas will be under dry spell, she noted. The southeast monsoon continues to bring cold tempera-

tures in many areas. "After this, once PAGASA officially declares the termi-

nation of amihan, we should expect high temperatures," Solis said

Based on PAGASA's projection, General Santos City could experience a heat index of 42 degrees Celsius on Tuesday.

Bacoor LGU, LTO establishes first inter-connectivity program outside **Metro Manila**

BACOOR CITY, Cavite (PIA) – The city government of Bacoor, Cavite and the Land Transportation Office (LTO) signed a memorandum of agreement for the implementation of a pioneer interconnectivity system outside of Metro Manila.

The LTO-LGU Interconnectivity Program or the Single Ticketing System, plays a vital role in enforcing traffic laws, where real-time data from the LTO's database is now accessible through the handheld devices used by Bacoor's traffic enforcers.

Under the agreement, Bacoor's traffic aids can now issue On-the-Spot Traffic Violation Receipts (OVRs) that will be directly linked to the motorist's record with the LTO.

The integration ensures that demerit points are promptly assigned to the driver's license subsequently after committing a traffic violation.

According to LTO guidelines, drivers who have accumulated demerit points or traffic violation records are no longer eligible for the 10-year validity of driver's license and could face suspension or revocation depending on the severity and frequency of violation. Mayor Strike Revilla together with Vice Mayor Rowena Bautista-Mendiola and other city officials signed the agreement on behalf of Bacoor, while Assistant Secretary Atty. Vigor D. Mendiza II - Regional Director Atty. Noreen Bernadette San Luis-Lutey represented LTO.

Asec. Mendiza delivered the message on behalf of Transportation Secretary Jaime Bautista, where the secretary noted that the digitization of government processes is in line with the mandate of President Ferdinand R. Marcos Jr., under the Bagong Pilipinas brand of governance. "The Department of Transportation, through the Land Transportation Office, intends to streamline traffic violations and fines throughout the country by institutionalizing this system. This is also a part of President Ferdinand Marcos Jr.'s program of digitalizing government systems and processes to establish better interconnectivity among agencies," the statement reads.LTO believes that the single-ticket system will bring convenience and improve compliance for motorists, and will lessen the corrupt practices of some traffic enforcers.

"We can see that the single-ticketing system will bear many benefits, not just for the local governments but for motorists as well. In this way, we can fight corruption and the wrongdoings of motorists who test our traffic enforcers, and the traffic enforcers who don't have integrity," Mendiza added.

Meanwhile, Revilla said that the program will expedite the process of delivery services to motorists in the city and will establish a more efficient system for paying fines and other traffic-related transactions which promotes transparency and efficiency.

"The LTO-LGU Interconnectivity program not only streamlines the ticketing process but also introduces a more accessible approach for violators to pay fines online, thereby reducing the inconvenience of physical transactions," the local chief executive said.

Once implemented, the DOTr and LTO said that the local single-ticketing system of Bacoor may become the model of observation for the future implementation of the same traffic system to other cities and municipalities nationwide. (RF/PIA-Cavite; with reports from Bacoor City Information Office)

BFP tells public in case of fire: Call first before you go live

CALAMBA CITY, Laguna (PIA) - Call us first before you

An official of the Bureau of Fire Protection (BFP) recently made this call as she advised the public, particularly social media users, how they can effectively help in fire incidents. In an interview with the Philippine Information Agency Sulong Calabarzon program, Chief Insp. Nerissa Eugenia Panergalin, chief of the BFP Calabarzon Fire Safety Enforcement Division, reiterated that authorities do not prohibit the public from posting images of fire incidents on social media, but they strongly encourage them to use the time to immediately call the nearest fire station and alert them on the incident so they could respond faster.

"We always remind the public to call their local fire stations before taking a video. We are in a democratic country, we are free to do this, however it would be more helpful if they call the fire stations first," Panergalin stressed.

She added that the urgent tip from the public will help fire responders and volunteers to be aware of the situation and immediately take action to extinguish the fire, save lives and find out its cause after the investigation.

In an interview with the Philippine Information Agency Sulong Calabarzon program, Chief Insp. Nerissa Eugenia Panergalin, chief of the BFP Calabarzon Fire Safety Enforcement Division, reiterated that authorities do not prohibit the public from posting images of fire incidents on social media, but they strongly encourage them to use the time to immediately call the nearest fire station and alert them on the incident so they could respond faster.

During the height of COVID-19 pandemic, Panergalin reported a decline in the number of fire cases and incidents

From January 1 to February 26, 2023 there were 271 reported fire cases in the region, but during the same period this year, it has since increased to 412 reported fire cases.

Panergalin said: "We observed a noticeable decrease in fire statistics during the pandemic and post-pandemic period and perhaps the presence of people in their residences contributed to the decline in fire incidents. However, now that we have returned to our regular activities, it is disheartening to say that the statistics are gradually increasing again". The fire bureau has since launched the 'Oplan Ligtas na Pamayanan' campaign to intensify their public awareness efforts and disseminate crucial information to the public regarding the significance of fire safety tips and to empower them with knowledge that can effectively prevent fire inci-

In addition to this, BFP IV-A also established the Handang Pamayanan Program which actively involves the barangays in community fire protection planning sessions. They also formed the Community Fire Auxiliary Group (CPAG), composed of barangay members trained to be the first responders to fire incidents under the guidance of the BFP. Through this, they assess each barangay and determine fire hazards in their respective areas in order to ensure prompt response in the event of a fire incident in their area. As the nation commemorates the National Fire Preven-

tion Month every March, Panergalin once again urged the public to adhere to basic safety tips to prevent fires as fire incidents tend to rise every March based on historical data. Some precautionary measures laid out by the BFP include: Ensure to unplug any electric appliances after use, use high-quality outlets and extensions, avoid octopus connections that may lead to short circuits or overheating, store matches or lighters in a place inaccessible to children, and conduct a personal Exit Drill in the Home or EDITH for the safety of everyone at home. 



In a message addressing the significance of the event, BM Romel R. Enriquez, Chairperson of the Committee on Social Services, Family, Women, Children, and Elderly, emphasized the commitment of the provincial government to prioritize the well-being of senior citizens, underscoring the importance of such initiatives in ensuring a dignified and fulfilling life for the elderly population in Cavite.





Orientation Seminar Empowers Senior Citizens in Drug **Abuse Prevention Education**

A significant milestone in the ongoing battle against drug abuse was achieved as more than 100 participants consisting of senior citizen leaders in Cavite gathered at the Bayleaf Hotel in the City of General Trias on March 1, 2024 for an Orientation Seminar on Drug Abuse Prevention Education for Senior Citizens. Organized by the Dangerous Drugs Board (DDB) in collaboration with the Provincial Government of Cavite through the Office of the Provincial Social Welfare and Development Officer (OPSWDO), the seminar aimed to raise awareness of the dangers of drugs and substance use, and to encourage the active participation and support of the senior citizens in the prevention of anti-illegal drugs.

This event was graced by esteemed personalities including Mr. Alvin S. Mojica, Provincial Administrator for Community Affairs, who delivered the message that the seminar is not just about imparting knowledge but also empowering senior citizens to be agents of change by harnessing the influential role of the elderly in disseminating crucial information on drug prevention within their families and communities. Assistant Secretary Maria Belen Angelita V. Matibag, Deputy Executive Director for Operations at DDB, shared a powerful message emphasizing the importance of collective action in combating drug abuse among senior citizens.

Throughout the seminar, participants delved into critical topics such as the Effects of Drugs on the Human Body, Treatment, and Rehabilitation Programs, presented by Dr. Jose Bienvenido M. Leabres from the Department of Health-Las Pinas Treatment and Rehabilitation Center. Asec. Matibag shed light on the National Household Survey's findings on drug abuse patterns and trends, while Atty. Ferdaussi B. Masnar elaborated on the provisions and penalties outlined in RA 9165, also known as the Comprehensive Dangerous Drugs Act of 2002.

The seminar also featured a comprehensive presentation on the Philippine Anti-illegal Drugs Strategy (PADS) and the current drug situation in the country. Asec. Matibag led discussions on overcoming the social stigma associated with drug abuse prevention, underlining the importance of empathy and support in rehabilitation ef-

The event concluded with a post-test and evaluation, followed by the distribution of certificates of participation to acknowledge the commitment of attendees towards promoting a drug-free community.
